How Do We Prepare Students For Competition?



Step 1: Give Them Structure

- Students will fill out an interest sheet
- Students will pick 1-2 state and 1-2 National competitions that interest them
- · Save competition picks to their computer
- They need to know what their competition is all about
- They should pick their own partners for their group competitions



This is a survey sheet (google doc) that I have the kids feel out and send back to me so I know what competitions they are interested in finding more information about.



This is an example of the poster I put up in my room for sign up. I laminate it and have them write on the form with a dry erase marker so that when/if they change their minds, or drop out, I can keep up with who is doing what competitions. It helps keep me organized.

Once everyone has had a chance to sign up, students may go back and pick more competitions to compete in. Students are allowed to compete in 1-2 State events and up to 2 National events. Some students may only want to take the ELF test. Prepare students that only compete in one thing to help with being a door monitor, time keeper, etc.

- Some competitions allow you to dress in costume
